

### Shinjuku

The area surrounding Shinjuku Station is a huge business, commercial, and entertainment center located atop the world's busiest railway station complex.

#### Shibuya

A historical capital of Tokyo where several historical monuments are located. From the most famous Sensoji Temple to Tokyo Skytree.





### **JAPAN 101**

#### **Essential Tips**



JST (Japanese Standard Time) is 9 hours ahead of GMT and has No Daylight Saving Time.



In March, Tokyo's weather is an average of 13°C during the afternoon, and 5°C during the morning and evening.





The Japan Rail Pass allows you to travel with any JR lines across the country including bullet train (excluding "Nozomi"). More details on the last page.



Free public Wi-Fi is not very reliable in Japan, a pocket wifi router might be the solution.

#### **Etiquette Tips**



#### Keep The Change

Tipping is not customary in Japan. It will often cause confusion, and the waiter will chase you down the street to give it back.

#### 📆 n the ringer to silent mode

Retrain from talking on your cell phone in the public. It's considered rude to speak on your mobile phone while on the train or bus, even in the elevator or restaurant.



#### Garbage Disposal

ごみ or ゴミ is the Japanese word for garbage. Types of Garbage for Separation: combustible (もえる or 燃える), incombustible (もえない) or 燃えない), PET bottles (ペットボトル) and bottles and Cans (びん・かん or ビン・缶).

#### Smoking only at designated areas

You can only smoke at designated outdoor smoking areas. It is illegal to smoke while walking in some areas.



#### **Etiquette Tips**



#### Eating while walking

Walking while eating is seen as sloppy. All vending machines have a bin next to them for you to discard any packaging and empty cans. All street food vendors usually offer a small area for you to eat your food right away.

#### Slurping

Slurping is considered as a sign that you're appreciating your meal in Japan. But while slurping your soup is okay, other eating sounds such as smacking and burping are not considered to be good manners.



#### Taxi Doors



Taxis can be hailed by raising your hand to one displaying a sign in the front windshield with the kanji 空車 (kusha) which means "vacant." The door will open and close automatically, so simply wait for it to open, get in the taxi, and then wait for the door to close

#### Removing Your Shoes

It is customary to change into slippers when entering a Japanese home, a traditional restaurant, a temple, and sometimes a museum. There are even special toilet slippers kept inside the bathroom.



#### **Useful Tips**



#### Japn Rail Pass

¥29,110/7-day & ¥46,390/14-day You may also use this pass for the Narita Express. We suggest you picking up your pass at the airport.

#### Reserving the bullet train seat

Present your pass to any JR ticket office or the Travel Service Center to make the reservation. You can do this in advance or even right before you plan to get on a train.



#### Suica Card

It is an electronic money card by JR to use for most of transportation in Japan and acceptable at most of convenience stores, vending machines etc. It is the best way if you are not familiar with Japanese money and wanna avoid fuss with dealing with coins.

#### Suica on iPhone or Apple Watch

To use Suica with Apple Pay, you need an iPhone 8 or iPhone 8 Plus or later, or an Apple Watch Series 3.
